DELIVERING SRHR SERVICES
IN FRAGILE CONTEXTS

In conflict-prone and fragile contexts, women and young girls in particular are highly vulnerable. They are continuously confronted with violence and aggression throughout society, with little to no protection against assaults. And in these environments, Sexual Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) are neither recognized nor addressed. Laws, parents, teachers, religious leaders, as well as health care workers can be barriers for young people to find the right answers and services to their SRHR needs.



What is the goal of Jeune S3?

We aim to ensure that young people, including the most marginalized and vulnerable populations - especially girls between the ages of 10 and 14 years old, are able to make informed choices about their sexual and reproductive health and that their rights are respected. We do so through a comprehesive multisectoral approach that consist of 4 intervention areas: Youth voice and participation; SRHR knowledge and skills; Responsive SRHR services; Enabling environment and respect of rights. Each of these strategies are essential on its own, but they are mutually reinforcing.

By 2020, through this comprehensive approach, Jeune S3 aims to reach **more than a million** young people in the most fragiles areas of Benin, Cameroon, Central African Republic and Democratic Republic of Congo.

We develop inter-faith tools to educate and empower religious leaders with the necessary information to better support young people regarding their Sexual and Reproductive Health



We develop and strengthen youth friendly services



We amplify the voice of youth at national, regional and international levels

With appropriate training, we facilitate discussions on Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights between young people



We promote inter-generational dialogues and safe spaces



We empower key populations (sex workers, LGBT communities, etc) to claim their rights and protect themselves



1.746 youth representatives "ambassadors" are doing SRHR advocacy and sensitization among their communities



122 health centers and 253 schools involved in providing SRHR education and services



1.452 teachers and (peer) educators are trained to provide sexuality education in and out of school on 253 schools



2.304 religious leaders and traditional leaders reached by advocacy on SRHR



106.977 young people were tested for HIV



30.139 parents are involved with education on SRHR



53.385 young people referred to family planning and reproductive health services



533.430 young people were reached by SRHR activities
